This series is closed to new investors. Investors who currently hold this series may purchase additional securities. Series A units of the fund may be switched to Series F and vice versa. IA Clarington may re-open the series to new investors in its discretion.

Distributions: Monthly distribution; fixed dollar amount per unit, determined monthly, with effect two months later, to target between 8% and 16% of the series' net asset value as at the last business day of the month; currently \$0.030 per unit per month (automatically reinvested in additional securities, unless you request to receive it in cash).

Minimum investment: Not applicable, closed to new investors.

What does the fund invest in?

The fund aims to maximize after tax income with a focus on the preservation and enhancement of capital by investing primarily in Canadian equities, with an emphasis on dividend-paying common shares. The fund may invest up to 30% of its assets in foreign securities.

The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund's investments on January 31, 2022. The fund's investments will change.

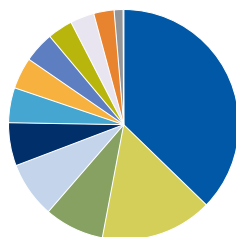

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

IA Clarington Investments Inc. has rated the volatility of this fund as **medium**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

Like most mutual funds this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

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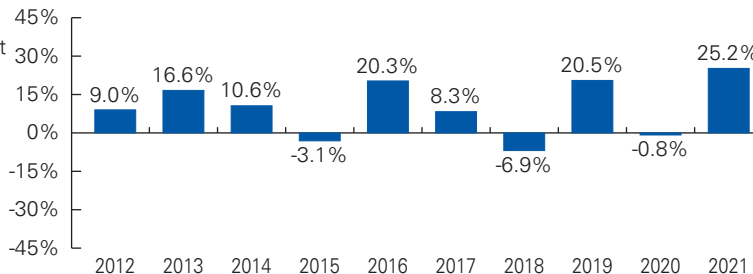
How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series F units of the fund have performed over the past ten years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Series F units of the fund performed in each of the past ten calendar years. The fund dropped in value in three of the ten years.

The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Series F units of the fund in a 3-month period over the past ten years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

A person who invested \$1,000 in Series F units of the Fund 10 years ago holds today \$2,441, which represents an annual compounded rate of return of 9.33%.

Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- Seek dividend income and the possibility for capital appreciation*;
- Have medium risk tolerance;
- Plan to invest over the medium to long term.

*Distributions on this series are expected to include a return of capital, which can erode the value of your investment.

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series F units of the fund. The fees and expenses, including any commissions, can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

This series is sold with no sales charge and no redemption fee. However, your representative's firm may charge you a fee in respect of your investment; any such fee would be set out in an agreement between you and your representative's firm.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As at September 30, 2021, the fund's expenses were 1.26% of its value. This equals \$12.60 for every \$1,000 invested.

Management expense ratio (MER) This is the total of the fund's management fee (including the trailing commission), fixed administration fee and operating expenses.	1.15%

More about the trailing commission

There is no trailing commission paid for Series F units of the fund.

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3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Dealer Advisor Fee	This Series is designed for investors who participate in programs that charge fees directly to the investor. Investors in this Series may pay an annual dealer advisor fee to their dealer. This dealer advisor fee is determined between the investor and the dealer. Depending on the arrangement between the investor and the dealer, the dealer advisor fee may be a component or may be the only fee payable in respect of an investor's investment account. We may have an arrangement with your dealer to collect the dealer advisor fee from you on behalf of your dealer, by redeeming (without charges) a sufficient number of securities from your account on a monthly basis. Where we collect a dealer advisor fee, the dealer advisor fee must not exceed 1.50% annually of the value of the net assets of the fund in your account. The dealer advisor fee is in addition to any other fees that are separately negotiated with and directly payable to us. Please speak with your dealer about this option and whether it's available.
Short-term trading fee	We may charge up to 2.00% of the value of units if there is a pattern of excessive redemptions/switches within 90 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Switch fee	Your representative's firm may charge you up to 2.00% of the value of units you switch.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund securities within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory. For more information, see the securities law of your province or territory or ask a lawyer.
